


The Adventures of Bella & Harry:

Teacher Guide to Let's Visit Paris!

Key Ideas and Details

- I. Develop questions for students that will lead to answers regarding, “Who? What? Where? When? and Why?”

Samples: Teacher can expand, change, or add to these.

1. Where do Bella and Harry ride on the plane to Paris?
2. What surprise did you find out about french fries?
3. As Bella is warning Harry to, “stay together,” what does he immediately do and what does this tell us about Harry? (Stress *mischievous* or *playful* rather than *bad* or *naughty*.)
4. Harry notices something strange about the eyes in the picture of the Mona Lisa. What does he notice? (See if any children have experienced a portrait or photograph in which the subject’s eyes seem to follow them as they moved past it.)
5. When Bella and Harry go back to their hotel to rest, what can they see through their window?
6. At the end of the story, Bella and Harry say, “au, revoir,” to us. What does that mean in French?

- II. Identify the main topics in a set of paragraphs.

Samples: Teacher should expand on and add to these depending on the students’ abilities.

1. Why do you think Bella chose to use giraffes to show Harry how tall the Eiffel Tower is?
2. Why do you think that the Arc de Triomphe is such an important landmark in Paris?
3. When Bella and Harry stopped for a snack, there was a sign that said Bistro. What do you think Bistro might mean in English?

III. Describe the connection between a series of events in a text.

Sample: Teacher can add to or expand on this.

Paris has many museums which contain art and exhibits from different times in history. Why is that important to us in today's modern world?

Craft and Structure

Determining the meanings of words and phrases in the context of the text.

Sample: Have the students identify the unknown word(s) and their meaning in each sentence below.

Page 12, Sentence 2

“Our boy is eating a jambon baguette, better known as a ham sandwich in our language!”

Page 13, Sentence 3.

“A crepe is a small, very thin pancake, filled with all sorts of tasty treats like cheese or chocolate”

Follow-up Activities for Students

Samples:

1. Write sentences using the “Common French Words and Phrases” on page 35.
2. Have the children write a letter to Bella and Harry telling them how much they liked the story or telling about a trip to a new place that they went on and what they learned about it.
3. Draw a picture of Harry looking at the Mona Lisa's eyes or one of the other sights they both saw in the book, The Adventures of Bella & Harry: Let's Visit Paris!

OR

Draw a picture of *yourself* looking at one of the interesting sights in a new place you visited recently.
